




HOW DOES VIDEO CATCH-UP WORK?



One popular view of anger says that it is counterproductive: we are more likely to communicate persuasively if we avoid feeling or expressing anger, and less likely to act destructively in pursuit of revenge against the target of our anger. In this presentation, Rebel Cole, Ph.D. will explore the origins and repercussions of two of the most consequential banking crises affecting the U.S.: the global financial crisis that began with the failure of Lehman Brothers investment bank in 2008 and persisted for several years; and the more recent banking crisis that started with the sudden failure of Silicon Valley Bank on March 10, 2023, and is ongoing. First, Cole will examine how a bubble in the housing market spread to the financial markets as housing prices collapsed during 2007-2008, primarily the role of structured financial products, including collateralized debt obligations (CDOs) and credit default swaps (CDSs). He will then explain how monetary and fiscal policies during and after the COVID-19 pandemic led to the failure of Silicon Valley Bank and Signature Bank of New York and threatened the viability of hundreds of other banks, including the role of "interest-rate risk." A Q&A session will follow this valuable program.

Of the eleven states that seceded from the Union and ultimately formed the Confederate States of America by early 1861, Florida was the smallest in terms of population and thus predictably contributed the lowest number of soldiers and sailors to the Confederate armed forces. However, with its natural resources and extensive coastline, Florida was strategically and economically very important. This presentation will highlight how the Union and Confederate armed forces made Florida a battleground from 1861 to 1865. It will explore the resources at stake, and the political factions and actors who shaped an interesting history in those terrible wartime years and who paved the way for Florida's postwar development in the Reconstruction period. The battles in Florida were nowhere near as large as those commonly described in history books, like Gettysburg and Antietam, but men still made the ultimate sacrifice on both sides and contributed to the war's final outcome in their own way.

This talk explores the two narratives that define the historical consciousness of the Chinese people and of the Chinese government today. The first is the "century of humiliation" narrative, wherein China was brought low by foreign invasion and exploitation over the hundred years from the 1840s

to the 1940s. The second is the perception that before that "century of humiliation," Imperial China was a natural and benevolent hegemon. This implies that for centuries there was something of a Chinese World Order and that the modern primacy of the West is an historical aberration. "Never Forget National Humiliation" and "Rejuvenate the Great Chinese Nation" are among Xi Jinping's favorite mantras and their pursuit explains a lot about how the PRC behaves, and about popular attitudes in China toward the outside world. Simply put, one cannot understand contemporary China without understanding how China's modern history — from 18th Century Hegemon to 20th Century Failed State — shapes how the Chinese think of their place in the world today and their expectations for China's future rise.

This past August, we commemorated the 25th anniversary of the tragic death of Princess Diana in a car crash in Paris. Significant questions still remain unanswered about the circumstances of her death. Was it, as the bulk of the media suggested, a simple case of drunk driving? Were there extenuating circumstances indicating premeditated manslaughter? Was there involvement of intelligence services in the tragedy? Steinberg was directly involved in the investigation following the Paris crash, with access to security camera footage, eyewitness debriefings, and court records. While media focused on speculation about Princess Diana's relationship with Dodi Fayed, the son of Mohammed al Fayed, owner of the famous Harrods Department Store in London, the backdrop to the 'Death of a Princess' was anything but the makings of soap opera or reality TV. 

Sid Caesar wanted to be a musician and began his career playing saxophone at resorts in the Catskills. It was only during his service in the Coast Guard (where he was stationed in Palm Beach!) that his comedic talents were discovered in a revue called "Tar and Spars." With the guidance of producer Max Liebman, Caesar turned his gifts for imitating languages, improvisation, and facial contortions into stardom with "Your Show of Shows." To be sure, many factors lay behind the rise of antisemitism; nevertheless, white nationalism today poses the most significant threat to Jews worldwide. This is because white nationalism has not only adopted the myths, racism, radical religious bigotry, and irrational attitudes towards the Jews but has also transformed the fear of minorities supplanting white people and Western civilization into an integral part of a transnational movement scapegoating the Jew as the force majeure conspirator. Significantly, White nationalists have exploited the Ukraine crisis to fan their antisemitism and deepen their transnational contacts. In this special lecture, Dr. Rabil will draw the ideological and practical connection of White nationalism to antisemitism and how they use antisemitism to spread their extremist ideology and enhance their power as a global movement. Dr. Rabil will also highlight Florida as a hotbed of White nationalist movements.



His invasion of England led to his defeat at Culloden, the last pitched battle ever on British soil. After his overwhelming defeat, Bonnie Prince Charlie hid in the moors of the Highlands of Scotland, always barely ahead of the English forces. Many Highlanders aided him during his escape, and none of them betrayed him for the £30,000 reward. Although his forces were defeated by the British, he remains a "romanticized" hero in Scotland.

Does the Constitution inform any such happenings? (2) Abortion lost Constitutional protection in 2022, but what about state constitutional protections? (3) Can state courts use their own Constitutions to avoid gerrymandering, despite the Supreme Court leaving almost total latitude in state legislatures to form Congressional districts? (4) In 2022, the Supreme Ct. expanded Amendment II beyond keeping guns for self-defense in one's home. What happens next?

Antisemitism is a category of hostility or hate that is very peculiar. It appeared for the first time in the ancient world, then in Christendom and Muslim countries. As the enlightenment broke with religion and traditional life, a new antisemitism emerged due to nationalism and liberalism. It later evolved into racism and genocide. The victorious Soviet Union and the rule of Stalin brought a new antisemitism associated with hostility to the State of Israel, which affected the Western left. Anti-Zionism gained significant intensity and hostility in the Arab world. Antisemitism in the western world has reappeared, particularly in academia and sectors of the Western left, primarily associated with the State of Israel. Likewise, there is currently an awakening of right-wing antisemitism. The course will analyze, in general terms, antisemitism from ancient times to these days. **Space is limited.**





Of all the people who ever succeeded at screenwriting, perhaps none was as talented or multifaceted as Dalton Trumbo. Trumbo (1905–1976) in the words of a colleague, "wrote a brilliant novel and a number of very good movies and demolished the Hollywood blacklist almost single-handed. His greatest achievement was just being the incomparable Dalton Trumbo." In this course, we will begin with the 2015 bio-pic entitled "Trumbo," in order to get to know the writer a bit better. Then, in the ensuing weeks we will view three of his greatest films – both the famous and not so well known. Unlike most screenwriters, "Trumbo" had no one genre for which he was best known. He scripted everything from romance to comedy and from crime to message flicks. Indeed, a man for all seasons and reasons!

Alexander Hamilton once described the Supreme Court as the "least dangerous branch" of the American government. Although this may have been true in 1789, the Court has evolved into a co-equal branch of the federal government. From Obamacare to same-sex marriage to the election of a President, it is the Court that ultimately has the final say on most of the important issues of the day. Despite this, it may be appropriate to call the Supreme Court the "least understood branch" since the Court does much of its work behind closed doors. In fact, very few Americans are aware of the Court's members, decisions, and day-to-day operations. The first half of this course will shed light on the least understood branch by looking at the history and inner workings of the Court. We will then look specifically at the cases and issues that have defined the Court's agenda and American politics over the past 60 years.

The Russian invasion of Ukraine has ended the post-Cold War era and ushered in a new era. Dr. Rabil has argued that although Russian President Vladimir Putin made a strategic blunder invading Ukraine, the invasion has provoked an international realignment of forces. This realignment has created three camps: A Western camp, led by NATO countries; an Eastern camp, led by Russia and China; and a neutral camp, led by countries opposing the war but unwilling to sanction Russia or China. Underestimated thus far by Washington, this realignment of forces has affected U.S. National Security. Washington can no longer rely on some of its former allies when its need to sustain its global leadership and support its foreign policy priorities have come under internal and external stress. In this special lecture series, Dr. Rabil will probe several foreign policy areas where American foreign policy needs to be reevaluated.


